I hope that everyone enjoyed the summer recess and was able to spend time with friends and family.

I'd like to talk about membership. The legitimate power of OILAs' voice resides entirely within its members. The will of our members is so important that according to our by-laws, OILAs' Board of Directors has virtually no authority to act without the approval of the membership. Our votes are the single most important asset to our organization in representing the will of island residents to our local government.

All of the 3,121 property owners on Okaloosa Island are associate members. However, in order to accurately represent the will of all islanders--all of the island's property owners need to become voting members of OILA.

Since our last members' meeting in June, the OILA Board of Directors has focused on facilitating the membership process by upgrading our online presence. Islanders now have the option to renew their membership simply by visiting oilaweb.com. There's the ability to auto-renew and make donations as well. On August 23, 2023 the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) hosted a ground breaking ceremony for the Brooks Bridge replacement project in Okaloosa County. The \$171 million project includes constructing two new parallel bridges over the Santa Rosa Sound to increase bridge capacity and improve traffic flow for this primary east-west connector between downtown

# DRAFT MINUTES: OILA MEMBERS' MEETING 12 JUN 2023

LEGACY DIRECTORS IN ATTENDANCE: ED HENDERSON, LOUIS BELANGER, FRANK ADCOCK, DAVID JONES, JACK POUS

INCOMING DIRECTORS IN ATTENDANCE: BRIAN HARRINGTON, JEFF BOGGESS, CHRIS MILLER, STAN KING

This meeting was held at the firehouse and via ZOOM on 12 June at 1900CST. A quorum was established at 19:02 with 5 board members being present. The minutes from the May meeting were not available at the time and secretary John Donovan stated that the pervious meeting's minutes would be briefed later in the summer. The treasury report was also not briefed.

Nick Hall rendered the ARC report for June with 3 projects gaining ARC approval. Ed Henderson introduced Brian Smith as a previous ARC member who was rejoining the ARC. Brian Smith mentioned his enthusiasm for ensuring that ARC approval process was done correctly. Dylan Hunt was invited to serve as an alternate ARC member. A member on Zoom questioned the status of the Beachview restaurant on Whelk Ct. Nick Hall stated that the ARC found that project not in compliance with the covenants and that the BCC had unanimously approved the project without discussion from the public. A discussion arose regarding Mr. John Dowd's challenging of the covenants by operating short term rentals our of a single family home located at 624a Pelican Drive. Further discussion regarding the logistic and traffic constraints arose regarding the Beachview restaurant, especially considering the BCC's intent to reduce traffic to 2 lanes in that area.

#### New and Unfinished Business:

Louis Belanger provided a progress report on the number of property owners on Okaloosa Island. After a thorough check, it was revealed that there are a total of 3700 properties on the island with a total of a little over 3,100 individual property owners. The intent is for these 3,100 owners to receive an informational postcard urging the to join OILA at their permanent residence. Jack Pous provided input regarding printing and mailing costs. Stan King mentioned the importance of following up with a personal contact following the postcard mailing.

Jack Pous led a discussion regarding the increase of membership dues primarily for the purpose of funding potential legal fees. He mentioned that the current dues structure is likely inadequate to support future litigation activities. He stated however, that a dues increase is at odds with OILAs goal of increased membership. Brian Harrington brought up the pending Dowd case v. the covenants and how the outcome of it impacts membership and OILAs future. The immediate need for an attorney to represent OILA was discussed. Brian Harrington mentioned that he already has an attorney looking into the relationship between the county and OILA.

Frank Adcock asked what single-family homeowners were willing to pay annually for dues. Brick Bradford brought up the fact that money spent for the purpose of litigation still requires membership approval. He stated that members need a sense of community and that there must be a value added to a dues increase. More discussion arose regarding assigning the appropriate balance between a dues increase and potential membership decrease with several members and directors providing input. Further discussion arose regarding voluntary donations to OILA and a method to facilitate these donations. Ultimately, it was decided not to cast a member vote on increasing dues at the time as the Board of Directors felt that there wasn't adequate representation of the membership to make a decision.

Jenny Harrison suggested that a committee be created for the purpose of surveying OILA members in order to determine an appropriate fee structure. She made a motion for 3-member sub committee to further investigate raising of the dues. Frank Adcock seconded the motion and Stan King agreed. Dave Sherry then stated that according to our by-laws, the president names the committees and the board ratifies the committee. President Henderson decided to leave this decision to the new board and the current board of directors concurred.

President Henderson then swore in the new members of the OILA Board of Directors: Brian Harrington, Stan King, Jerry Boggess, and Chris Miller. Ed Henderson then thanked the membership for their support during his tenure. Frank Adcock thanked Ed Henderson for his service and made a motion to adjourn and was seconded by Ed Henderson.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:42pm.



This photo collection of the current state of the construction work on the new Brooks Bridge is provided for the OILA members who live outside the Fort Walton Beach area. Those of us who are local see this construction every day. As noted in previous articles, eminent domain has been completed. All affected properties have been demolished. To date, the main lanes on the existing bridge are open without restriction. The estimated completion date is mid-2027. Improvements are:

- 1. Increase vertical channel clearings from 50 feet to 65 feet and the horizontal clearance from 140 to 150 feet
- 2. Six travel lanes up from 4 lanes on the current bridge
- 3. Reconstruction of existing intersections to improve traffic. Upon completion, the only traffic light on Okaloosa Island will be found at the Convention Center -Boardwalk intersection.
