REPORT FROM THE PRESIDENT – Brian Harrington

The decorations along Santa Rosa Boulevard look outstanding and I'd like to offer my sincerest thanks to Nancy Hunt and her tireless crew whose efforts have once again transformed our island into a holiday paradise.



The lane reductions associated with Okaloosa County's Santa Rosa Blvd improvement plan continue to be in the forefront of OILA's concerns. I've formally asked the commander of Eglin AFB for the Department of Defense's position on the potential lane reduction as this issue affects the military range complex located at the west end of the island. As you may recall, it was Eglin AFB that ultimately halted the Florida Department of Transportation's plan to build a bridge from Wright Parkway to Okaloosa Island in 2014.

Improving Okaloosa Island's aging infrastructure is long overdue. At last month's Board of County Commissioners meeting, the director of Okaloosa County's water and sewer department put forth a proposal to replace all of the water mains on the island. Although this proposal didn't make it to the floor during the November meeting, I am hopeful to see this project addressed in early 2024 as it clearly benefits all islanders.

At the end of last month, we mailed out over 3,000 postcards to Okaloosa Island property owners in an effort to inform them about OILA and encourage them to join. So far, the results have been overwhelmingly positive. In the first five days since the postcards were received, we added 18 new members and our website traffic has increased by 1,200%. I recently took a phone call from one of the Island's condominium HOA vice presidents who had never heard of OILA. However, thanks to the postcard he is now encouraging others to join. I appreciate the efforts of everyone who collaborated on this project.

Our website continues to develop—stay tuned as we're nearly ready to go live with members' portal. Once in the portal, you'll have the ability to indicate your top priorities for OILA and address issues that concern all of the membership. We also intend to upload volumes of OILA's historical documents and make this database searchable. I'd like to thank Jay Waschak for the many hours he's spent improving the website which is the public face of OILA.

As we're not holding a December members' meeting—on behalf of the Board of Directors we hope that you are able to spend the holidays with loved ones & that the New Year finds you in good company and good health. We're looking forward to making Okaloosa Island the best it can be in 2024.

HELP SAVE AND BRING THE MONARCH BUTTERFLY BACK **TO FLORIDA AND OKALOOSA ISLAND**

Editor's Note: During 2023 an attempt was made to create a positive, reproductive, nursery environment for the Monarch butterfly on Okaloosa Island. This effort was centered on planting and growing milkweed. Milkweed is the sole host plant of the monarch butterfly. Monarchs lay eggs specifically on milkweed, the eggs hatch into caterpillars and the caterpillars eat the foliage. Seeds, and in some cases seedlings, of the milkweed plant were provided to Island residents. A special planting of milkweed seedlings was completed in the Women Veterans Monument Park on Okaloosa Island.

This same effort will also be made in the year 2024. To assist in the effort to help the Monarch butterfly recover following is an article provided by OILA member, Ed Henderson, which details how you can help by reporting any Monarch butterfly sightings you might see this winter (December 1, 2023 thru March 1, 2024). The Monarch butterfly has been in decline for the last 20 years and it is important for scientists to know their population numbers. Scientists Need Help Reporting Monarch Butterfly Sightings in the South

This Winter – by Meghan Overdeep

Accurate data on their migration and winter behavior is crucial to their conservation.

Scientists are on the hunt for monarch butterflies hunkering down for the winter in the South, and they need help.

Monarchs typically migrate to Mexico for the winter months, but, according to the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), as their populations have declined over the last two decades, more have been observed wintering and even breeding in the Southern U.S.



monarch butterflies are currently being considered for listing under the endangered species act, it's essential for the scientists and officials making that decision to understand their population and changing behavior. Accurate data on their migration and overwintering behavior is crucial to the conservation of this iconic insect.

So, for the second winter in a row, the partnership of universities, agencies, and other organizations known as Monarchs Overwintering in Southeastern States is requesting the public's involvement.

From December 1 through March 1, the public is encouraged to report monarch sightings in North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, and Texas using the partnership's online data portal at JourneyNorth.org/sightings.

"Volunteers are vital to this effort," Susan Meyers, co-chair of Monarchs Across Georgia, said in a news release. "If you enjoy being outdoors and exploring your local ecosystem, this is an easy activity that can be done alone or with your family."

Last winter, volunteers from across the Southeast and Gulf states provided more than 5,800 observations of monarch butterflies.

"When we come together as a community as we have with this effort, we stand a better chance of protecting the monarch butterfly for future generations," Yellin said in a release.
