

FOR THE FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (FDOT) FOR THE SANTA ROSA SOUND ALTERNATE CROSSING STUDY!

The purpose of the advisory group is to facilitate ongoing community dialogue in the study process and to provide opportunities to input in developing and evaluating project alternatives. The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) meeting is anticipating the first meeting during the month of August at the City of Ft Walton Beach Public Library.



## OKALOOSA ISLAND FIRE DEPARTMENT PRESENTED A CERTIFICATE OF APPRECIATION BY CHIEF GIULIANO FROM THE EGLIN AFB FIRE DEPT

At the June 17, 2015 meeting of the Okaloosa Island Fire District Board of Fire Commissioners Eglin Air Force Base Fire Chief **Mark Giuliano** presented a Certificate of Appreciation to Okaloosa Island Firefighters for their assistance in responding to the search on March 11, 2015 for a missing U.S. Army HU-60 Blackhawk helicopter with 11 personnel aboard. Tragically, the helicopter had crashed and none of the passengers survived. Below is a copy of the certificate of appreciation (which also shows a photo of the recovery command post) followed by separate read box which restates the wording of the certificate). Chief Giuliano went on to state how his Department's relationship with the Okaloosa Island Fire Department..(continued below photo)



**During the early morning hours of 11 March** 2015, The Okaloosa Fire Department responded to a call for assistance to search for a missing United States Army, UH-60 Blackhawk helicopter with 11 personnel on board, last reported operating in the vicinity of Santa Rosa Island west of Hurlburt Field. Chief 4, Assistant Chief 4 and Engine 4 responded to Eglin Fire Station 8, reported to the Incident Commander and were assigned shoreline search patrol of the Inter-Coastal Waterway. Search parties quickly discovered and collected aircraft wreckage and human remains ensuring the dignified collection of the fall crew members. The unselfish devotion and professionalism demonstrated by the members of the Okaloosa Island Fire Department reflects great credit upon themselves and their department.

...is rock solid and by having made this tragedy easier by knowing people from different agencies. Chief Giuliano went on to state the official cause of the accident was spatial disorientation in which the pilots didn't switch to instrumentation in the fog and caused them to become disoriented to their location to the shoreline and water. Chief Giuliano said he assigned OIFD to shore duty and when items such as body bags were needed for a dignified recovery, Chief Tilley quickly obtained them. Chief Giuliano said he was at the Fire Board meeting to say thank you and that he could not have started the recovery without Okaloosa Island Fire Department help. Chief Giuliano presented Chief Tilley (Chief 4) and K.C. Carvalho (Assistant Chief 4) Appreciation Letters from Commander Lt Col Moore. Commander's Coins and Chief's Coins. Captain Ray Strawn, Engineers Greg Lloyd and Jared Vause and Firefighter Mario **Zayas-Bazan** (Engine 4) were also presented Chief's Coins for their efforts in the recovery.



OKALOOSA ISLAND FIRE DEPT WINS STATE OF FLORIDA GRANT FOR THE PURCHASE OF 7 PHILLIPS AED (Automated External Defibrillator) MACHINES

#### The Phillips Automated External Defibrillator

Okaloosa Island Fire Department Medical Division Officer, Phil Metz, wrote a grant to the State of Florida requesting monies to purchase 7 Phillips AED machines totaling \$11,725.25. The grant was approved and OIFD received \$8,794.00 making the OIFD cost a total of \$2,931.25 – a savings of 75% for the Fire District. The machines have been received and are in service.

An automated external defibrillator (AED) is a portable electronic device that automatically diagnoses the life threatening cardiac arrhythmias of ventricular fibrillation and ventricular tachycardia in a patient, and is able to treat them through defibrillation, the application of electrical therapy which stops the arrhythmia, allowing the heart to reestablish an effective rhythm.

With simple audio and visual commands, AEDs are designed to be simple to use for the lay person, and the use of AEDs is taught in many first aid, certified first responder, and basic life support (BLS level cardiopulmonary resuscitation
