



THIS MONTH IN HISTORY - FEBRUARY

Feb 3, 1913 - The 16th Amendment to the U.S.Constitution was ratified, granting Congress the authority to collect income taxes.



February 15, 1898 - In Havana, the U.S. Battleship *Maine* was blown up while at anchor and quickly sank with 260 crew members lost. The incident inflamed public opinion in the U.S., resulting in a declaration of war against Spain on April 25, 1898, amid cries of "Remember the Maine!"

February 19, 1942 - Internment of Japanese Americans began after President Franklin Roosevelt issued an Executive Order requiring those living on the Pacific coast to <u>report for relocation</u>. Over 110,000 persons therefore shut down their businesses, sold off their property, quit school and moved inland to the relocation centers.

February 24, 1885 - Admiral Chester Nimitz was born in Fredericksburg, Texas. He commanded Allied naval, land and air forces in the South Pacific during World War II, and signed the Japanese surrender document on September 2, 1945.

Beach Access No. 5 (located between Island Echos and Emerald Isle Condos as of February 10, 2018

IMPROVMENTS TO BEACH ACCESSES NOs 4, 5 & 6 ARE WORKS IN PROGRESS

The construction upgrade to these accesses is moving along. The improvements will feature portable toilets with elevated, more-permanent types of bathrooms, elevated boardwalks and pavilions and pavement of the gravel parking lots. The elevated structures will meet new floodzone requirements, and the new amenities will match those already in place at accesses No. 1, 2, 3 and 7. This \$1.7 million, bed tax-funded project is being built by Floridian Construction and Development Co.

The work at access No. 4 is expected to be completed by March 1. The work at No. 5 could be done by April 15 and construction at No. 6 could be completed by May 25.

Butterflies are self-propelled flowers. Isn't that a charming description! You are invited to attend the February 14 meeting to hear speaker Ruth Sykes as she enlightens us how to entice these 'self-propelled flowers' to visit our patio or garden.

Sykes is president of the FWB Kiwanis, a member of the Garnier Beach Garden Club and founder of The Butterfly Garden Project, which came about after seeing butterfly habitats decline through increased pesticide use, urban and suburban development and the demand for well-manicured

lawns and roadsides. Scientists agree that without bees, after only five years, we wouldn't have food.

Many species of butterflies and bees are disappearing due to the loss of natural habitat. You'll be delighted to find out that by planting even a few 'key' plants, you can attract butterflies as well as hummingbirds and beneficial insects like bees. By creating their habitat on our properties, we can save these pollinators AND have colorful visitors.

- III. ANNOUNCEMENTS: Asst Fire Chief Ray Strawn announced the availability of a free "File of Life" card which can be used by a person to list (in pencil) their medications and medical conditions. This card, which can be stuck on your refrigerator, would provide vitial, life saving information to first responders and emegency room personnel. Asst Chief Strawn passed out free cards and advised that more cards could be obtained at the Fire Station. Our Fire Department is the BEST!

VI. COMMITTEE REPORTS:	28,673.00

- A. Architectural Committee: No activity reported for the month of December 2017 (Secretary's note: Correction: There were two items reviewed on December 21, 2017 both of which are posted parallel with the January 2017 report which is in the February 2018 OIL Lantern.
- B. Membership: 2017-2018 Dues Renewal Close Out Final Report Jim Simpson: The final membership total after the 2017-2018 renewal drive was 243. This is a 96% renewal rate based on the last year's total of 257.
- C. WebSite: **Bob Seitz:** Bob advised that photos and information about the Leaseholder's 2017 Christmas activites are now posted on the website.
- D. Street Lighting MSBU: Paula Hudson: Paula reported that the County is having problems with posting charges. We getting billed for only 10 out of 29 irrigation pumps - \$350 instead of \$1,200. Also, monthy reports that were posted by the 5th of the following month are being posted on the $18^{th}-45$ days after closing. For November revenues were \$5,700, street light expenses were \$2,640 for a profit of \$2,782. The "qualified" ending balance is \$263,123.

- E. Derelicit Property Committee Report: No Report
- F. Boat Basin: Carol Edlund: There as a lot of discussiion about the current status and future of the Boat Basin. Tripp advised that the Leaseholders are confront with "decision time". Trip advised that he and Paula Hudson inspected the Basin and found it to be sub-standard. It was pointed out that Okaloosa County did not accept the Lease Fee check from the Basin Committee this year. Tripp opened the floor for ideas. Mike Mitchell advised that Okaloosa Island Authority established the basin and that had initially hired a consultant to come up with a master plan to have one at each Sound Side access – but only the one on access No. 2 was built. Also, Okaloosa Country inherited the basin when the Authority was abolished and the Island transferred to Okaloosa County. It was intended for use by Island residents who did not have access to a dock. Triipp advised that the price tag to bring the Basin up to standard (electircal, seawall, etc) would be substantial. He opened up the possibility of TDC funding. David Sherry suggested looking into the Triumph Fund (Triumph Gulf Coast is a trust fund set up by the Legislature, to help the eight counties in the Florida Panhandle most affected by the BP spill) for funding. Questions were asked about what would be the status of the Basin if it was upgraded with public funds – would it be for Island residents or would it be open to the general public. This classification is important since there are private properties adjacent to it. Tripp was also interested in what were the contractual obligations between the County, the Leaseholders Associaton and the Basin Committee. Tripp asked for a motion to authorize him to meet with the County and the Boat Basin users to come up with a plan as to what needs to done and come back to the membership with recommendations. Paula Hudson made the motion and it was approved. He also advised that he welcomes input on this subject and provided his cell phone number: 850-218-8835.

VII. OLD BUSINESS

A. Summary of OILA's 2017 Christmas Program – **Nancy Hunt:** First, the membership gave Nancy a hearty round of appaluse for the quality of this year's Christmas program. Nancy thanked all the volunteers who helped with this year's effort. She recommended having a water front Christmas display contest for Islanders with property on the sound. These properties could be viewed by floating down the sound or by obseving them from Ft Walton Beach. She also noted how well (despite being reacheduled due to bad wather) the Christmas caroling event at The Gulf was received.

VIII. NEW BUSINESS

- A. Status of the Okaloosa Island Boat Basin **Tripp Tolbert:** Covered in detail under the above Boat Basin Report (Agenda Item VI. F)
- B. Beautification of the Medians on Santa Rosa Blvd (Lighting Options) **Tripp Tolbert**: Tripp advised that he had been in contact with a non-profit organization, Trees of the Coast. The trees on Holiday Island costs about \$3,000 each; but Trees of the Coast can provide them at a cost of \$1,500. Tripp is going to see how well this species of tree survived the recent cold weather. He wants to work with the OILA Beautification Committee on any future landscaping proposals.
